In many ways, the second half of the 20th century was a high point for Jewish-Christian relations. Today, however, the anti-Israel politics of certain powerful Christian bodies hampers interfaith relations and threatens to breathe new life into medieval doctrine that demonized Jews for hundreds of years.

In 2007, the World Council of Churches, an umbrella organization of mostly liberal Protestants claiming a membership of 580 million worshippers, convened the "Churches Together for Peace and Justice in the Middle East Conference." The conference produced the Amman Call, a document that condemned violence and endorsed a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, but denied Israel's right to a future as a Jewish state.

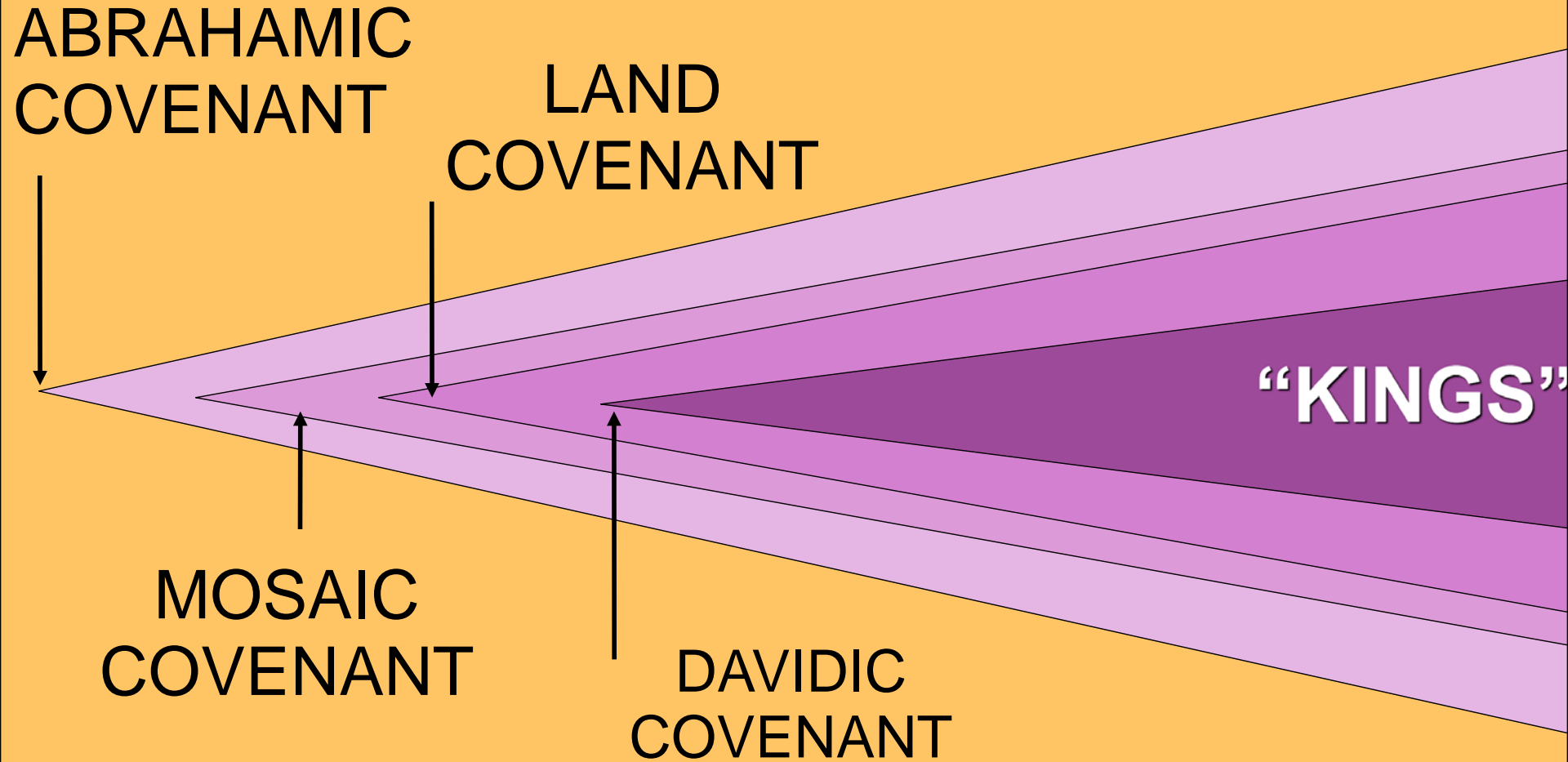

Key Events in KINGS

The Temple: Construction and Dedication

2 Chr. 7:12, “Then the LORD appeared to Solomon by night, and said to him: ‘I have heard your prayer, and have chosen this place for Myself as a house of sacrifice.

2 Chr. 7:13, “When I shut up heaven and there is no rain, or command the locusts to devour the land, or send pestilence among My people,

2 Chr. 7:14, “if My people who are called by My name will humble themselves, and pray and seek My face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land.”

Key Events in KINGS

The division of the Kingdom

Warning: Disobedience brings national judgment

Israel: 19 evil kings; judgment, military defeat, deportation

Judah: 8 obedient kings; blessing, military security, prosperity

Key Events in KINGS

Elijah/Elisha

Grace before judgment

Demonstrates the extent of evil in the Northern Kingdom.

Exposes the rejection of God in the north.

Provides “convincing proof” that the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob is superior to Baal: Providing rain, grain, health, prosperity, and protection

Key Events in KINGS

The genuine revivals under Hezekiah, Josiah

Grace before judgment

The Word of God, the *Torah*, is the basis for genuine reform and renewal.

Exposes the trend of rebellion among the nation.

Provides the last opportunities to the nation to turn back to God and avoid judgment.

Lam. 3:21, “This I recall to my mind, therefore I have hope.

Lam. 3:22, “Through the LORD’s mercies we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not.

Lam. 3:23, “They are new every morning; Great is Your faithfulness.

Lam. 3:24, “ ‘The LORD is my portion,’ says my soul, ‘Therefore I hope in Him!’ ”
