

Why Study the History of Interpretation?

- 1. We can see the errors of others and the consequences of those errors.
- 2. It helps us to see the importance of having a correct interpretation.
- 3. We can learn what influences a misunderstanding of God's Word.
- 4. It helps us see how intelligent students of the Bible have sought mystical meanings or multiple meanings of the text.
- 5. Gives us insight into how others have tried to solve difficulties in the past.


Allegorical Interpretation

- 1. Usually, but not always, denies or ignores the literal meaning of the text.
- 2. Allegorical interpretation believes the real meaning or the spiritual meaning underlies the letter or the obvious meaning of the passage.
- 3. Allegorical interpretation often attempts to reconcile apparent contradictions between the literal meaning and moral or spiritual principles.




Greek Philosophers

To avoid the anthropomorphisms and immoralities of the Greek gods




Alexandrian Jews (Aristobulus, Philo)

To avoid the anthropomorphisms of God, and to link Judaism and Greek philosophy



Apostolic Fathers

To avoid the anthropomorphisms of God, and to explain O.T. types



Alexandrian Christians (Pantaenus, Clement, Origen)

To avoid the difficulties of Scripture, and thus to uphold the rationality of Christianity

"If Scripture says that Adam 'hid himself from God,' the expression dishonors God who sees all things—and therefore it must be allegory. If we are told that Jacob sends Joseph to look after his brethren when he had so many servants, or that Cain had a wife or built a city, or that Potiphar had a wife, or that Israel is an 'inheritance of God' or if Abraham be called 'the father' instead of grandfather of Jacob—those are 'contradictions,' and therefore the passages in which they occur must be allegorized."
