



#### **Outline of Psalm 34**

- A. David declares his praise to God, Psa. 34:1-10.
  - 1. David vows to praise God and to call for others to join him in praise, Psa. 34:1–3.
  - 2. David describes God's deliverance, Psa. 34:4-7.
  - 3. David exhorts others to trust the LORD for protection and provision, Psa. 34:8–10.
- B. The descriptive praise instructs others to praise God, Psa. 34:11–22.
  - 1. David calls upon others to learn and experience God's goodness, Psa. 34:11–12.
  - 2. David instructs others of God's goodness to the righteous and those in need, Psa. 34:13–22.

# Synonymous Parallelism

The thought expressed in the first part of the verse is repeated in the second part, in different but equivalent terms (Psa. 2:4; 19:1; 36:1, 2; 103:11, 12; Prov. 3:13–18).

# Synthetic Parallelism

The idea expressed in the first line of a verse is expanded and completed in the following line(s) (Psa. 1:1; 3:5, 6; 18:8–10; Prov. 26:3).

#### **Antithetic Parallelism**

The idea expressed in the first line of a verse is contrasted to that in the second line.

Psa. 90:6, "In the morning it flourishes and grows up; In the evening it is cut down and withers."

#### **Emblematic Parallelism**

The idea expressed in one line of a verse is a complete picture or emblem which illustrates the idea expressed in the other.

Psa. 103:13, "As a father pities his children, so the LORD pities those who fear Him."

The Angel of the Lord is identified as *Yhwh* in Genesis 16:7–13 (also in Genesis 22:11–12; 31:11, 13; 48:16; Judges 6:11, 16, 22; 13:22–23; Zechariah 3:1–2).

Gen. 16:7, "Now the Angel of the LORD found her [Hagar] by a spring of water in the wilderness, by the spring on the way to Shur."

Gen. 16:10, "Then the Angel of the LORD said to her, 'I will multiply your descendants exceedingly, so that they shall not be counted for multitude."

Gen. 16:13, "Then she called the name of the LORD who spoke to her, You-Are-the-God-Who-Sees; for she said, 'Have I also here seen Him who sees me?'

Gen. 16:14, "Therefore the well was called Beer Lahai Roi; observe, it is between Kadesh and Bered."

The Angel of the Lord is distinct from *Yhwh* in Gen. 24:7 (also in 2 Sam. 24:16; Zech. 1:12).

Zech. 1:12, "Then the Angel of the LORD answered and said, 'O LORD of hosts, how long will You not have mercy on Jerusalem and on the cities of Judah, against which You were angry these seventy years?"

The Angel of *Yhwh* is a distinct person from *Yhwh* and is worshipped as equal with *Yhwh* indicating a divine person.

Gen. 32:1, "So Jacob went on his way, and the angels of God met him.

Gen. 32:2, "When Jacob saw them, he said, 'This is God's camp.' And he called the name of that place *Mahanaim* [two camps]."

Psa. 34:7,
