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2021 Independence Day Special Psalm 35:19–28 – Part 3

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4. 1776.

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When in the Course of human events ...

The *First* Continental Congress, 1774

"Be Thou present, O God of Wisdom, and direct the counsel of this Honorable Assembly; enable them to settle all things on the best and surest foundations; that the scene of blood may be speedily closed;



"that Order, Harmony and Peace may be effectually restored, and that Truth and Justice, Religion and Piety, prevail and flourish among the people ..."

Psalm 35 Structure

Vss. 1–10: a cry to the Lord to come to the aid of the Psalmist to protect him and vindicate him against the unjust, unmerited, and undeserved attacks of his enemies.

Vss. 11–18: describes those persecuting David, the witnesses against him, how they returned evil for good.

Vss. 19–28: David calls upon God to punish the wicked and vindicate David according to His righteousness.

- III. David calls upon the LORD to render justice to those who stir up strife against those who live at peace (19–28).
 - A. The petition is to stop the wicked from stirring up strife by their vicious words (19–21).

Psa. 35:19, "Let them not rejoice over me who are wrongfully my enemies; Nor let them wink with the eye who hate me without a cause."

In summary:

- They are liars,
- They have contempt for him,
- They belittle him,
- They have no cause to be his enemies, only their own hate,
- These would resonate with the colonial leaders.

Psa. 35:20, "For they do not speak peace, But they <u>devise</u> <u>deceitful</u> matters Against the quiet ones in the land."

Time Line of Events Leading to Independence

- 1. Initial Charters and Colonies. Founded on private money.
- 2. 1649 Parliament acknowledged that only the House of Burgesses could tax Virginians.
- 3. 1650s Britain attempted to redefine the relationship to her advantage. The colonials resisted, no resolution was found.
- 4. 1680s James II attempted to unite all of the New England colonies under the direct control of the Crown.
- 5. 1688 When William and Mary came to the throne, the English government officially recognized its dependence on the consent of the people's representatives.

"It seems to us that early Reformed authors on this subject are struggling with a tension, if not a quandary. On the one hand, resistance by private persons seems the natural outgrowth of the doctrine of sola Scriptura and the derivative understanding of a right of conscience. On the other, these authors are elites who seem to fear opening the door to chaos and disorder of the sort seen in Münster (1524-25)."

Warned Parliament about the colonists

What is Nature's Law?

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

"The law of nature is that which God at the time of creation of the nature of man infused into his heart, for his preservation and direction ... this is lex aeterna, the moral law, called also the law of nature. And by this law written with the finger of God in the heart of man, were the people of God a long time governed, before the law was written by Moses who was the first reporter or writer of law in the world." ~Sir Edward Coke



Various Judicial Offices 25 October 1592 – 15 November 1616 "This will of his maker is called the law of nature ...

"This law of nature, being coequal with mankind and dictated by God himself, is of course superior in obligation to all other. It is binding over all the globe, in all countries, at all times, no human laws are of any validity, if contrary to this."

~Sir William Blackstone Commentaries in the Law of England We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed,—That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness.

"These words reflect arguments long made by patriots in New England, many of whom likely never read Locke and almost all of whom were serious Calvinists. Of course, their primary drafter, Jefferson, definitely read Locke and was most certainly not a Calvinist. Jefferson indisputably borrowed language from Locke, but for Roger Sherman and other Calvinist delegates, the famous paragraph quoted above predated Locke by years. There is little evidence that Sherman and the delegates with Reformed backgrounds—such as William Williams, Samuel Huntington, Oliver Wolcott, Josiah Bartlett, William Whipple, Matthew Thornton, John Hancock, Samuel Adams, John Adams, Robert Treat Paine, William Ellery, William Floyd, Philip Livingston, Richard Stockton, John Witherspoon, John Hart, Abraham Clark, James Smith, James Wilson, Thomas McKean, and Lyman Hall—viewed these ideas through a secular Lockean lens and every reason to think that they embraced them as consistent with their Reformed convictions."
